Paralympian finds safe haven

Lee Kuxhaus, an Air Force veteran from Dallas and a below-knee amputee, is a member of the Capital Region Nordic Alliance's paralympic skeleton team. She began training this week in Lake Placid, thanks to a Capital Region organization that provides a safe environment for disabled veterans to learn and compete in a variety of paralympic nordic and winter sports.

Karen Fagan of Troy, director of development for the Nordic Alliance, is serving as Kuxhaus' main support during her training and competition in Lake Placid. Fagan also is coordinating a tangled web of logistics — many of them COVID-



related — for a team of paralympic bobsledders and sliders from throughout the U.S. gearing up for nationals Saturday and Sunday in Lake Placid.

The Lake Placid Olympic Center is hosting winter athletes competing while preparing for both the Winter Olympics in February 2022 and Paralympic Winter Games in Beijing in March 2022.

"CRNA invested in a number of skeletons to afford our veterans with disabilities the opportunity to experience and excel in skeleton without the burden of purchasing skeletons that cost approximately \$7,000 and are made in Germany," said Russ Myer, executive director of the Capital Region Nordic Alliance. "We plan to host more veterans (men and women) as paralypians in the coming years."

Kuxhaus is a multi-sport athlete who competes in cycling, swimming and road racing. She most recently

No. 6 Alabama 80, LSU 79: Herbert Jones drove for a go-ahead layup with 19.5 seconds remaining and Alabama won the Southeastern Conference Tournament for the first time since 1991, holding off a late flurry by LSU. is making the transition from hand-cycling to upright, and moving from wheelchair to ambulatory road races, thanks to improvements in her recovery — both mentally and physically.

"I had problems adjusting to my leg," she said, "but then I stopped worrying about walking and started living. I was on the Warrior Games team for the Air Force, and at first did all my adaptive sports in my wheelchair. That's when I really started recovering. I did the sport of triathlon, and then I felt that I was ready to try my leg again and I did it. And it worked. It was my attitude.

"Now I'm living again. My leg has worked very well," she said.

The sport of skeleton is her favorite, even though training and competition opportunities are limited.

"They just put you on the sled and push you down this ice," she said. "When I first tried it and I got to the bottom I felt so incredibly alive, it's just an amazing sport. I couldn't wait to do it again. It's the most alive I've ever felt. I didn't know how much of an adrenaline junkie I was until I tried skeleton, and then I fell in love with it."

Making people feel alive is one of the major goals of CRNA. Expert coaching from current

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January that put her in the hospital.
